

Why Orthographic Development Matters:

What is Orthographic Development

Orthographic development refers to how students learn to recognise and spell words in their language.

This learning process is detrimental in the building of a students' fluency in reading and writing.

Teaching students to link the sounds they hear to letters and recognise word patterns will ultimately strengthen their written and reading skills.

How can YOU do this?

Through focused instruction in orthography, you too can support leaners of all stages (early readers, ELL, students requiring literacy intervention) in their language journey! In this brochure we will give you some tips and tricks to start your students' language adventure!

Strategies to Support Orthographic Development:

1) Teach Phoneme and Grapheme connections

 Explicitly help students understand that sounds (phonemes) are represented by letter groups (graphemes).

2) Multi-Sensory Activities

 Activities that combine visual, auditory and tactiles inputs reinforce a learners' orthographic skills.

3) Provide Repeated Practice

• Try to utilise high-frequency and patterned words for regular practice to build up automatic word recognition.

4) Regularly Assess your Students' Development

 Conduct spelling inventories to determine your students' orthographic development stages and use to guide targeted instruction.



HERE ARE FOUR ACTIVITIES THAT ENCOURAGE ORTHOGRAPHICAL LEARNING!

1) Word Sorts:

With Word Sorts have your students' group words by vowel patterns (long/short) or affixes (ex. prefixes/suffixes)

Example: Sort words that have 'oo' - soon, moon, racoon, loon, loom...

2) Spelling Games:

Utilise games such as Bingo, Memory Match or make your own games to practice high-frequency words.

3)Spelling Journals/ Journaling:

Have students track new words, focusing on the spelling patterns and word meanings.

Example: In daily/weekly journal sessions introduce a new word or phrase that students must use in their journalling.

4)Tactile spelling:

This is a fun hands-on learning activity where students can use things like sand, dirt, shaving cream or other textured things (velvet, paper etc.) to trace out new words.

Stages of Orthographic Development

Once you start focusing on orthographical knowledge in class your students will begin to move through several learning stages!

Emergent

 These are our pre-readers and our scribble letter writers: those with little understanding of sound-symbol correspondence

· Letter Name-Alphabetic

 This is when students are now able to match letters with sounds. They will often be spelling phonetically (ex."grat" for "great")

· Within-Word Pattern

 Students start recognising common spelling patterns (ex. blends and long vowels)

· Syllables and Affixes

 Students are spelling mutlisyllabic words, prefixes and suffixes

· Derivational Relations

 Students understand how word meanings relate through roots, prefixes and suffixes!
